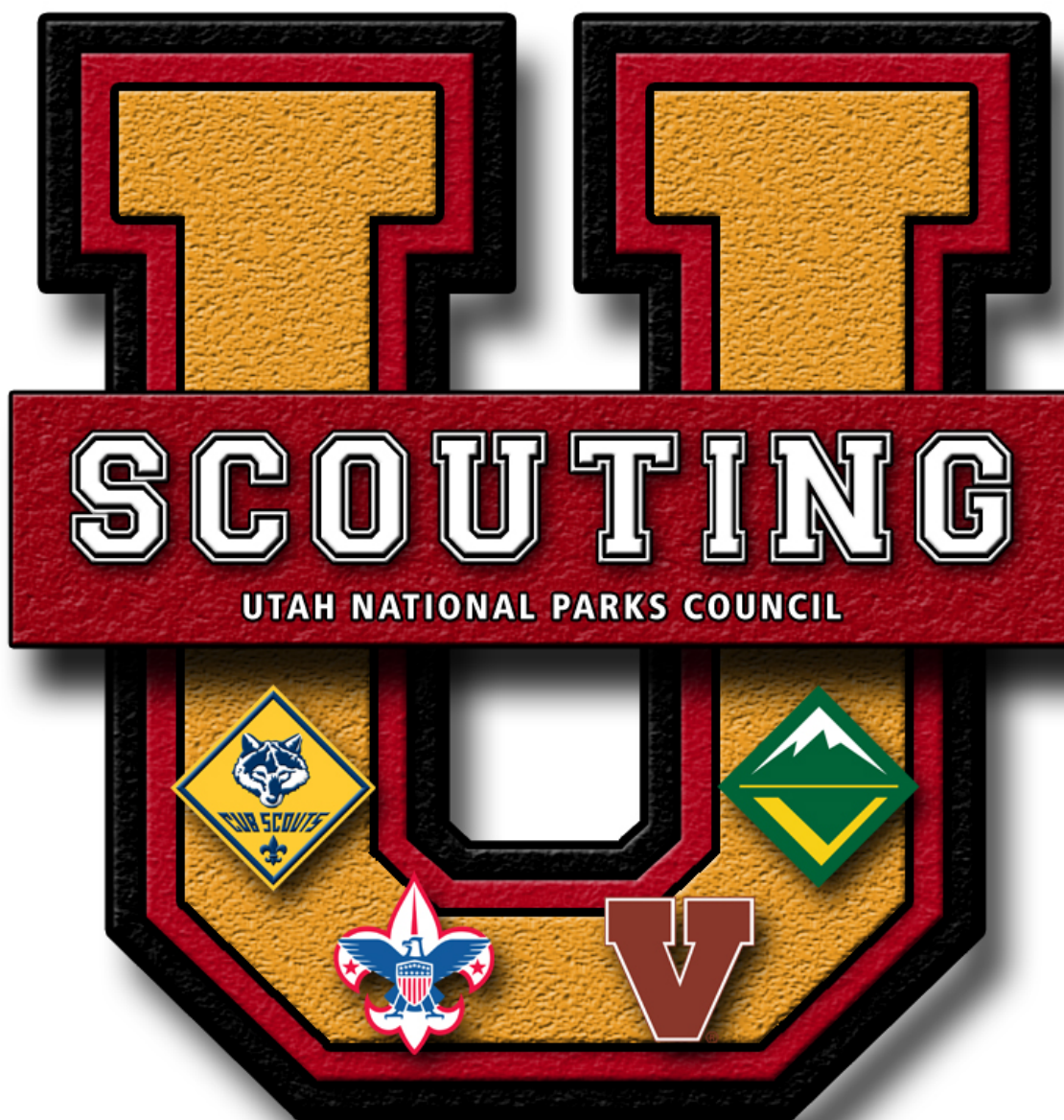

The Vision, Mission and Organization of University of Scouting

Our VISION is to provide you with the best possible opportunity to improve your capability and skill set as a Scout leader and improve your productivity so that you may accomplish more in less time. The motivation is our desire to provide the highest possible quality scouting experience for our youth.

To accomplish our vision our mission is to provide Utah Scouters and Scouts a distinctive educational experience including a broad array of introductory, supplemental, and advanced training for all Boy Scouts of America (BSA) adult leader positions in support of every youth program. As such, we hope to provide the most comprehensive range of training courses of any BSA training venue in the region.

The Utah National Parks Council University of Scouting (UoS) course offerings are organized into seven colleges. Each college provides unique support of their respective area and is chaired by a Dean who is responsible for courses and instructors in their respective area. Additionally, the UoS hosts a University Midway where participants will find organizations (profit, not-for-profit, service and community based) which support the Boy Scouts of America.

For the year 2014 we have the following areas: *(Attend a maximum of 7 classes during the day in one or all of the colleges.)*

1. College of Cub Scouting
2. College of Boy Scouting
3. College of Varsity Scouting
4. College of Venturing
5. College of Advancement
6. College of Training
7. College of General Studies
8. University Midway

Our secondary mission at the University of Scouting is to help provide scholarships for our youth to attend national advanced youth leadership training. We believe in education and aim to help our youth experience the awesome training at Philmont and other BSA national bases. Registration

Registration can be done online at www.UtahScouts.org/uos or by filling out the registration form at the end of this catalog and bringing/ mailing it to the UNPC Scout office in Orem.

Breakfast

This year, the UNPC Silver Beaver Colony will be assisting the University of Scouting by cooking up a delicious breakfast for all interested participants to help provide scholarships for our youth to go to National Advanced Youth Leadership Experience (NAYLE) at Philmont. Register for breakfast and get priority registration check-in for the day! The cost is \$3 for an awesome breakfast!! Please help us provide scholarships and help our youth.

Lunch

Lunch for most everyone will be provided during two lunch periods: A) from 11:00 am – 11:50 am and B) 12:00 pm – 12:50 pm. Cub Scout Leaders may choose to attend the Blue and Gold Banquet-style Cub Scout Leader lunch break in the main gym at the Institute. (pre-register as a class to attend the Cub Scout lunch break). You may bring your own lunch or pre-order a meal during registration. If you sign up for the Lunch - Blue and Gold Style, that does not reserve a lunch for you. Lunch cost is \$5 and includes: your choice of turkey, ham, or roast beef on white bread or a veggie sandwich. All sandwiches come with lettuce, tomatoes, and pickles. Lunches include chips, 2 cookies, mayo and mustard packets, soda OR water.

Thank you for your dedication to effective Scouting. Your participation in this training event illustrates that you care about the quality of the Scouting program that you are able to deliver for the youth whom you serve. The ability of Scouting to make a difference for our youth depends on volunteers like you who participate in training programs to seek broader knowledge and continual improvement. This event provides the broadest variety of Scouting course offerings under one roof available for Scouters and Scouts in our area.

Please enjoy your visit with us today. Absorb all that you can, and then relay what you have learned back to your units, districts, and councils. This is your primary responsibility as a University of Scouting participant. But please don't stop there. Scouting needs you to help our program be even more effective next year. There are three key ways that YOU can help. As a University of Scouting participant, we have the following requests to ask of you.

#1: Feedback is a gift. Your feedback for each class taken and for the University of Scouting as a whole helps to guide the staff to further improve the program for next year. Any and all constructive feedback is greatly appreciated. Please use the evaluation form to let us know what you liked and what you didn't. The gift of your feedback enables us to ensure that we continue to meet your needs as a Scouting leader.

#2: Get the word out. Did you know that it takes almost the same time for the staff to prepare this event whether we draw 100 or 2000 participants? Or that it takes our instructors the same time to prepare whether 1 or 125 participants register for the class? Therefore, the effectiveness of this event to have a positive impact on the youth in Scouting is directly proportional to the number of seats filled in the classrooms. YOU are our best channel for promotion. We anticipate your experience with us today will be positive and rewarding. Please share that with your Scouting colleagues and encourage them to come with you this year and next year. Bring a friend with you!

#3: Share what you know. What's the difference between a faculty or staff member and a class participant? NOTHING! We are all Scouting volunteers. All staff members have "real" Scouting jobs just like you. Okay, maybe there IS one difference – the faculty or staff member stepped up to share their Scouting experiences or other talents to help the rest of us be more successful. Code of Conduct

All participants, staff and guests are expected to conduct themselves in accordance with the principles set forth in the Scout Oath and Law. Tobacco, alcohol and use of illegal drugs are strictly forbidden. Remember that we are guests at our venue. Scouts (and Scouters) always leave their environment better than they found it and we encourage everyone to clean up after themselves and others. We need your help in practicing Leave No Trace throughout the day. Youth protection measures are in effect at all times.

Cell Phone Policy

Cell phone courtesy is expected at all times. Texting during class is prohibited and phones must be on vibrate-only mode. If you absolutely must take a call, please exit the class discretely. Note that the UoS staff does use their cell phones for urgent communications during the event. This is a key to our event-day communications.

Identification Policy

Every UoS participant must be registered and must wear their identification tag picked up at the Check-In desk. Please bring your Internet registration receipt to check in.

Please remember that walk-in registration is limited to availability with a \$15 fee and that our online registration closes on Wednesday night, 11:59pm, February 5th.

Youth Policy

The UNPC University of Scouting is a Boy Scouts of America training program designed for adult leaders. There is no program for children or childcare facility, and participation of youth in UoS classes and ancillary activities is available for select classes only. Thus, young children are not eligible to attend the UoS, and UoS participants are not encouraged to bring children to the UoS event.

Refund Policy

Event fees are final except in a limited number of circumstances where a partial refund may be granted. You may transfer your registration to another scout leader.

Policy Observance

UNPC University of Scouting Degree Program

The University of Scouting degrees provide Scouters a structured program in which they can advance and be rewarded with degrees and titles for each level of achievement. They also can gain a stronger sense of self-worth and a better understanding of their increasing value to the Scouting community. The atmosphere is one of fun and fellowship, but there's also an attitude of respect for the importance of the event . . .

It's all about the youth.

Students are inspired to return each year, not only to learn and earn higher degrees, but also to share their experiences with fellow students. And the atmosphere of camaraderie and school spirit invigorates the students, inspiring them to return home and share their enthusiasm with Scouts and other leaders. These degree programs are designed to provide an incentive for continued training and as a method to recognize Scouters who participate in that training.

The University of Scouting offers Bachelor's and Master's degrees in five home Colleges:

- Cub Scouting
- Boy Scouting
- Varsity Scouting
- Venturing
- General Studies

Important: *Commissioner Science degrees may only be earned at College of Commissioner Science events.*

There are also two Doctorate degree programs available in the Utah National Parks Council:

- Doctorate of Scouting—available at University of Scouting
- Doctorate of Commissioner Science—available only at College of Commissioner Science events.

Degree requirements for credit hours are satisfied by taking courses in the Utah National Parks Council's University of Scouting. Instructors/faculty may receive a one-time only credit for teaching a specific course at the University of Scouting. Only courses from UoS 2013 and newer count toward these degree programs.

Degree candidates are encouraged to submit their degree applications at any time during the year rather than wait until the day of the University of Scouting. Applications should be sent to the Vice Chancellor of Administration. You may submit your application the day of University of Scouting at the registration desk, but we will not be able to process that day and we will be in touch with you.

Those applicants that are approved will receive a certificate and pin for their UoS patch designating their degree.

DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

ASSOCIATE'S DEGREE REQUIREMENTS:

1. Be a registered Scouter.
2. Have current Adult Youth Protection for your registered position.
3. Complete basic BSA training for your registered position.
4. Complete six (6) University of Scouting courses to include:
 - a. Three (3) courses from your home college
 - b. Three (3) elective courses from General Studies or other college



BACHELOR'S DEGREE REQUIREMENTS:

1. Be a registered Scouter with current Youth protection.
2. Complete basic BSA training for your registered position.
3. Hold an Associate's Degree from UNPC University of Scouting.
4. Complete an additional six (6) University of Scouting credits for a total of twelve (12) credits:
 - a. Three (3) new credits from your home college, and
 - b. Three (3) new elective credits from General Studies or other UoS college

MASTERS DEGREE REQUIREMENTS:

1. Be a registered Scouter with current Youth Protection.
2. Hold a Bachelor's Degree from UNPC University of Scouting.
3. Complete six (6) additional University of Scouting credits for a total of eighteen (18) credits:
 - a. Two (2) additional credits from your home college, and
 - b. Four (4) additional elective credits from General Studies or other college
 - c. One credit must be a **Doctorate Preparation Course** where you design three (3) goals to accomplish over the next year.
4. Complete three position-related supplemental training courses. Examples include:
 - a. Cubs: BALOO, Shooting Sports, Hazardous Weather, Outdoor Leader Skills for Webelos Leaders (OWL), District Committee Training Workshop, Safe Swim Defense, Certified CPR/First Aid course, Trainer's EDGE, Akela's Council, and any American Red Cross health and safety course.
 - b. Boy Scout / Varsity / Venturing: Safe Swim Defense, Safety Afloat, Trek Safely, Climb on Safely, Merit Badge Counselor Orientation, Health and Safety Course, Leave No Trace Workshop, T.R.A.I.L. BOSS, Powder Horn, Climbing Instructor, BSA Lifeguard, Trainer's EDGE, District Committee Training Workshop, certified CPR/First Aid course, and any American Red Cross health and safety course.

DOCTORATE OF SCOUTING DEGREE REQUIREMENTS:

1. Be a registered Scouter with current Youth Protection.
2. Candidates must have earned their Wood Badge beads.
3. Hold a Master's Degree from the UNPC University of Scouting.
4. Complete six (6) additional course credits for a total of twenty-four (24) credits:
 - a. A University of Scouting faculty member may receive one (1) course credit for each different class delivered at University of Scouting.
5. Earn an adult leader award for your registered position:
 - a. **Cub Scout:** Scouter's Key, Scouter's Training Award, Cubmaster Award, Tiger Cub Den Leader Award, Cub Scout Den Leader Award, Webelos Den Leader Award, or the Cub Scouter Award
 - b. **Boy Scout:** Boy Scout Leader's Training Award, Scoutmaster's Key, or the Unit Leader Award of Merit
 - c. **Varsity Scout:** Varsity Leader's Training Award, Varsity Coach's Key, or the Unit Leader of Merit
 - d. **Venturing:** Venturing Leader's Training Award, Venture Advisor's Key Award, Skipper's Key Award, Venturing Leadership Award, or Venturing Advisor Award of Merit
6. Complete a **Doctorate Review Course** where you report on how you completed your Doctorate Prep goals.

Note: All Commissioner Degrees may only be earned at a College of Commissioner Science event, not at University of Scouting. For all forms relating to the UoS degree program, see the end of this document.
